- Financial struggles where you start calculating grocery costs in your head and learn the value of every dollar spent.

"Did I make the right decision?"
"Why is this so much harder than I imagined?"
"Will I ever feel at home here?"

But here's what you don't realize yet.

Every challenge is shaping you.

The first time you navigate a train station without getting lost, the first time you crack a joke in another language, the first time you help someone who was once a stranger—all of these moments chip away at the uncertainty and build a stronger version of you.
